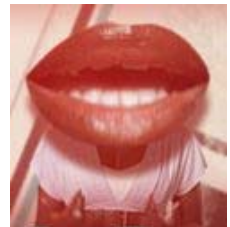
Beat the Clock Award

In this section of the newsletter I interview new members through the medium of electronic mail. This month I introduce Monika Stelzner who joined in June this year.



Briefly introduce yourself.

I'm Monika Stelzner and I am an accountant with my own public practice. Currently I am a director of two boards - The Chatswood Chamber of Commerce (as honorary treasurer) and Ku-Ring-Gai Financial Services Ltd who operate a community bank in Turramurra and possibly one in Lindfield (we are at the feasibility stage).

And what were your main reasons for joining Toastmasters?

The main reason was to join a group and learn how to network and improve my communication skills. Before Toastmasters, I had no experience at all with public speaking and avoided it like the plague.

Tell me about your experience of delivering your ice breaker speech.

It wasn't as traumatic as I thought it would be. After preparing the speech and sending it to my mentor for comment, then making a few adjustments, it didn't turn out too bad. I had a good reaction from the audience. They came up to me afterwards to comment on the experience I had described.

Now that you have participated in table topics and given speeches, do you prefer impromptu speaking or prepared speaking?

Both are good. They serve different purposes and both help in me finding my voice.

Successful speeches usually contain three main ideas. If you had three words to describe yourself, what would they be?

Different - inquisitive - thoughtful.

Is there anything else you would like to say about Toastmasters and your public speaking goals?

I need to be able think on my feet and to answer questions, instead of coming up with lame responses. I can usually think of witty things to say long after the event has passed.
